Grant-funded project addresses childhood obesity

Agricultural Economics and Agribusiness faculty are collaborating with UAMS on a grant-funded project (AFRI) to address childhood obesity. The project, Arkansas Grow Healthy Study, involves innovative research and educational programming that is designed to bring several complementary interventions to address aspects of the childhood obesity crisis. A key component of the project is development of a farm-to-school distribution network designed to enhance access to local fruits and vegetables for school children. The farm-to-school effort will begin in the fall of 2012 with the identification of project pilot schools to develop networking programs. One of the criteria for selecting a region is interest and capacity of area growers and the school system. Key steps in the process involve:

- Working with elementary schools to increase servings
- Conducting a systematic foodshed assessment
- Designing interventions to build capacity among potential farm-to-school stakeholders
- Piloting the entire farm-to-school program

The ultimate result of this four-phase pilot is to increase the number and variety of local vegetables and fruits served in selected Head Start preschools and public elementary schools in Arkansas. Projector and Video Conferencing Enhancements

An effort is underway to upgrade the digital projectors in several of the LRSO conference rooms and the auditorium. This will involve replacing some of the existing projectors and upgrading others. Conference room 206 is the first conference room to receive a new projector providing higher resolution images for improved clarity, a larger and brighter image and a new video connection port using HDMI compatible plugs and cabling.

Improvements to the video conferencing capability in Classroom 3 are under evaluation. The upgrades include a higher resolution camera and supporting hardware and software upgrades needed to support true high definition (1080p) video conferencing.

Tuition Information

Full-time (100%) appointed employees may enroll in undergraduate or graduate courses offered at any University of Arkansas System campus (except Medical or Law School) at 10% of the cost of tuition for courses offered by the employee's designated home campus. Attendance is at the discretion of the supervisor. You must designate a "home campus" that will stay with you throughout your career with Extension. Employees will pay 30% of the cost of full tuition for courses offered at any University of Arkansas campus other than the designated home campus.

Spouses and unmarried dependent children of full-time (100%) appointed employees may enroll in courses offered at any campus in the University of Arkansas System (except Medical, Law or Graduate School). Spouses and unmarried dependent children may take up to 132 undergraduate semester credit hours at 50% tuition at a designated "home campus" or at 60% of full tuition at any other campus within the University System.

Employees, spouses and/or dependent children will pay the difference between the cost of regular tuition and the discounted tuition charge for all electronically delivered courses such as CIV, Internet, web based or distance education courses.
