Arkansas Flower & Garden Show marks 25 years of learning

While the spectacular gardens, vendors and how-to talks may change, one thing has remained a constant through the 25 years of the Arkansas Flower and Garden Show: it funds scholarships for students and grants for beautification projects. Since 2006, the Arkansas Flower and Garden Show has given more than \$61,000 in scholarships and nearly \$80,000 in grants, all funded from the sale of tickets.



"Education has truly been at the root of the Arkansas Flower and Garden Show," said Krista Quinn, the show's executive director. "The scholarships have benefited horticulture students at the University of Arkansas, Arkansas Tech, Arkansas State University and Southern Arkansas University."

"And on a personal level, I was fortunate enough to be one of the early scholarship recipients," she said. "Working for the show is a way of giving back to the organization that helped me earn my college degree and it's incredibly rewarding that we continue to support the next generation of horticulture professionals in the state."

This year's "Silver Celebrations" themed anniversary show was held Feb. 26-28 at the Statehouse Convention Center in Little Rock.

EFNEP and UAMS team up to teach healthy habits to Marshallese community

There are an estimated 10,000 to 12,000 Marshallese living in Northwest Arkansas communities. The Washington and Benton County EFNEP programs partnered with the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences' (UAMS) northwest campus in Fayetteville in 2015 to encourage healthy eating and physical activity for Marshallese families.

After a presentation to UAMS staff members by Celia Boon, FCS agent in Benton County and EFNEP supervisor, the staff agreed the Eating Smart-Being Active curriculum, designed for paraprofessional nutrition educators to use in teaching limited resource families with young children about healthy lifestyle choices, would be an appropriate program to use to encourage healthy habits for Marshallese families.

The classes are taught in community churches, made available through the assistance of church pastors who see the need to improve the health of their congregations.

The connection with UAMS and the churches has led to ongoing EFNEP classes and, so far, the graduation of three groups of Marshallese women. The husbands of the participants became interested in the classes, so some of the men are now attending the Eating Smart-Being Active lessons.

The classes are taught by Kim Krummel, EFNEP program assistant in Washington County. ■

at the organization's experiment station in Stuttgart. 

University Health Plan – Spouse and Dependent Child Eligibility Verification Process

Aon Hewitt has started mailing letters announcing the Dependent Eligibility Verification to employees who are enrolled in the University health plan with coverage for a spouse or dependent children.

If you do not cover your spouse or dependent children in the University UMR health plan, you will not receive a letter for the dependent verification.

Carefully review the letter(s) and any follow up information you receive and respond with the requested documentation to Aon Hewitt as quickly as possible. The University wants to extend coverage opportunities to all eligible participants, but if the needed documentation is not provided for spouses and children, they will be deemed ineligible and coverage will be terminated.

If you do cover a spouse or children on the health plan, you may want to begin collecting routine documents such as your marriage license, birth certificates and prior year federal tax return (first page only, showing dependents, with all monetary information blacked out).

All questions about acceptable documentation, alternative document options and questions about details of the verification process should be directed to the Aon Hewitt Dependent Verification Center at the number provided on the notification letter(s).
