Bike to Work Day

Information Technology Update

Computer Use Policy Update: C.E.S.P. 4-19 was recently updated. There were four significant changes

- Clarification that IT requires maintenance access to CES computers. IT employees will be respectful of the users' privacy to the best of their ability. IT does monitor network traffic for performance reasons.
- 2. Users are discouraged from downloading CES data (spreadsheets, documents, etc.) on non-UAEX computers outside of office networks. This was part of an audit finding regarding the protection of sensitive financial/personnel information.
- **3.** Users are discouraged from loading non-work related software and data on their CES computers.
- 4. Additionally, guidance is provided when a non-maintenance or someone other than the computer's assigned user requests access to data on someone else's computer. The intent is to ensure the request has multiple levels of approval and documents the reason for the request.
