Arkansas 4-H awards college scholarships, sponsorships to outstanding youth

Years of detailed project work, community service and leadership efforts have paid off for 32 4-H members in the form of college scholarships.

The Arkansas 4-H Foundation recently awarded \$24,000 in college scholarships to youth across Arkansas. Amounts ranged from \$500 to \$8,000.

"These scholarships directly help our 4-H members continue to excel," John Thomas, managing director of the Arkansas 4-H Foundation, said. "These would not be possible without generous donors, many of whom are former 4-H members who want to pay it forward for future generations."

The Arkansas 4-H Foundation has awarded more than \$170,000 to 4-H members this year, enabling them to attend summer camps and leadership and citizenship trainings. The foundation also provides sponsorships for more than 40 students with winning record books to attend National 4-H Congress in Atlanta each year, a trip valued at \$1,500 per person.

Record books reflect each student's achievements in leadership, community service and work in their chosen projects. 4-H offers more than 70 projects spanning the arts and humanities, healthy living, civil engagement, animal and plant sciences, engineering and technology. •

Washington County teen wins Arkansas 4-H Governor's Award

Janna Morse's service to others took root in Washington County more than a decade ago and has since expanded far beyond Arkansas' borders. The West Fork teen received the 2022 Arkansas 4-H Governor's Award, the highest honor an Arkansas 4-H member can receive.

Gov. Asa Hutchinson announced Morse, 18, as the winner on July 27 in a recorded message played during the Arkansas 4-H Awards of Excellence ceremony at the University of Arkansas, where more than 300 4-H members from across the state competed in statewide events.

"4-H has given me a foundation of confidence and made me an avid goal-setter," she said.

Arkansas-grown berries used in Arkansas blackberry beer pilot project

For blackberry lovers, the sweet, tart fruit is the star of many summer dishes. One Arkansas blackberry producer, Ritter Farms, teamed up with the UA System Division of Agriculture, Arkansas Brewer's

Guild and Stone's Throw Brewing to create a flavorful batch of blackberry beer, made with berries bred through the UA System blackberry breeding program and grown in Arkansas. Blackberry – and beer – fans sampled the results at a tasting on Friday, July 22.

Attendees tried beer made in one of two ways: one with whole, fresh blackberries and the other with juice and puree from fresh blackberries. The blackberry juice and puree were processed at the Division of Agriculture's Share Grounds at Three County Fairgrounds in McCrory. The program connects Arkansas growers and food entrepreneurs with the technical assistance

and infrastructure needed to start or scale-up food businesses.

Amanda Philyaw Perez, extension associate professor of food systems and food safety specialist, said Ritter Farms in Judsonia primarily sells their blackberries for wholesale, fresh markets. Ritter Farms estimates that each summer they have more than 200,000 pounds of excess blackberries that cannot be sold to these markets.

In an effort to use these excess berries and create a value-added food product, Ritter Farms is working with the UA System and Stone's Throw Brewing to evaluate the use of these Arkansas-grown blackberries for beer production. Philyaw Perez said she hopes this pilot project will help expand blackberry beer production in breweries around the state, as the brewing industry has shown to be a valuable source of support for local food systems in other states.

"It's worked in other communities around the country," Philyaw Perez said. "Where the beer flows, the food, culture, art, entertainment, local agriculture and economic development follow."

The event kicks off with appetizers and libations in the center's teaching garden. Master Gardeners, who maintain the garden, will provide tours and answer questions about the native plants and in the garden.

Dinner begins at 6:30 p.m. lakeside, near the center's rose garden, and will feature locally sourced and seasonal foods. Kordsmeier Music, a music group comprised of former 4-H members, will provide entertainment.
