

Extension Retiree Scholarships awarded for 2021

Extension retirees awarded \$750 scholarships to Creenna Bocksnick, 4-H camping coordinator at the Arkansas 4-H Center: Tyler Caston, county extension agent – staff chair in Stone County; Abby Hilton, fiscal support analyst in the Little Rock State Office; and Andrew Sayger, county extension agent- agriculture in Monroe County. This is a record amount of scholarship dollars awarded from the extension retiree scholarship endowment. Recipients were recognized during the retiree luncheon July 1, 2021 at the Arkansas 4-H Center.



Creenna Bocksnick is pursuing a PhD in Agriculture Food & Life Sciences at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville. Creenna has served as the 4-H camping coordinator at the Arkansas 4-H Center since 2014. She believes that earning a PhD will benefit her in her current position and future career goals within Extension.

In one of Creenna's letters of recom-

mendation, the writer wrote, "Creenna is a lifelong 4-H'er. She is an innovator who truly has the best interest of everyone she works with in mind. She is an asset to 4-H and an asset to Extension and the U of A System as a whole. Everything she is involved in is improved by her involvement."

Tyler Caston is pursuing a Master of Science in Agriculture Food & Life Sciences at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville. He believes the education he has gained thus far has allowed him to pass on knowledge to his clientele in Stone County through educational programs and demonstrations.

Tyler began working for Extension in 2015 as a county extension agent –

agriculture and was appointed county extension agent – staff chair in 2017. His supervisor wrote that he has been very creative in implementing innovative ways to reach the public with the Extension mission and message and is respected by his peers, especially in his knowledge of horticulture.



Abby Hilton is pursuing a Bachelor of Science in Business at the University of Arkansas eVersity. Abby has worked as a fiscal support analyst in the finance department at the Little Rock State Office since 2016.

Through her course work she has learned more about the financial decision-making process and this helps her explain why policies are in place. She

feels that completing her degree in business will open more doors for her professionally, and she hopes to put the experience and newfound knowledge to use in the Division of Agriculture for many years to come.

Abby's supervisor wrote, "I cannot think of a person more worthy of this investment than Abby. Since I have known her, she has consistently proven to me that she is a hardworking, motivated, and dependable employee who is a natural leader."

Andrew Sayger is pursuing a Master of Science in Agriculture Food & Life Sciences at the University of Arkansas Fayetteville. He has served as the county extension agent – agriculture for Monroe County since 2017.

Andrew shared that the degree he is seeking has not only improved his expertise in agriculture and extension education but other areas as well. One of the biggest advantages



he has gained through the process so far is leadership and communication skills.

In one of Andrew's letters of support the writer shared this: "I dare say in the near future, he will be known for his knowledge and expertise in row crop agriculture. I've been impressed with his work ethic and how he is building his clientele base in Monroe County. He is basically building the program from the ground up-one brick at a time."
