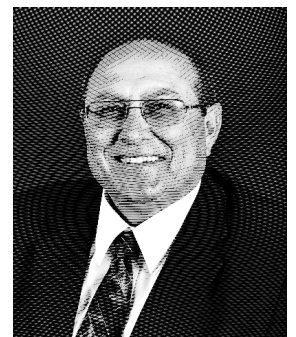

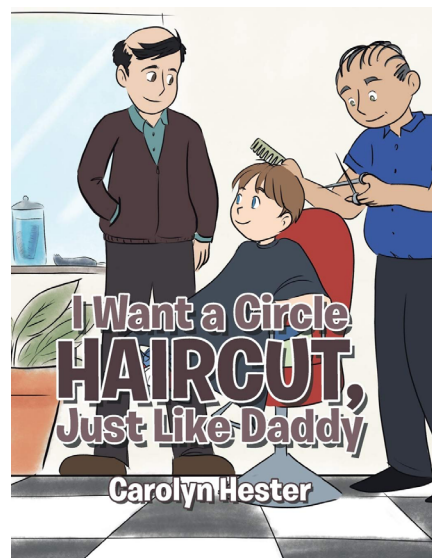
## Writing in Retirement

Former Cross County extension agent Carolyn Hester has taken up a new hobby in retirement: writing children's books.

Two of her books have been published, and a third is in the works. All three stories were also inspired by her own children. The first book "Where did Yesterday Go?" - published in 2018 - takes its title from the question asked by Hester's son Kyle, whom she credits with giving her the idea for the book.

"One night when I couldn't sleep, I got up and wrote it," she said.

The manuscript, however, stayed in her computer for nearly two years until she saw an ad for Christian Faith Publishing and called. The second book - "I Want a Circle Haircut Just Like Daddy" - was published earlier this year and is based

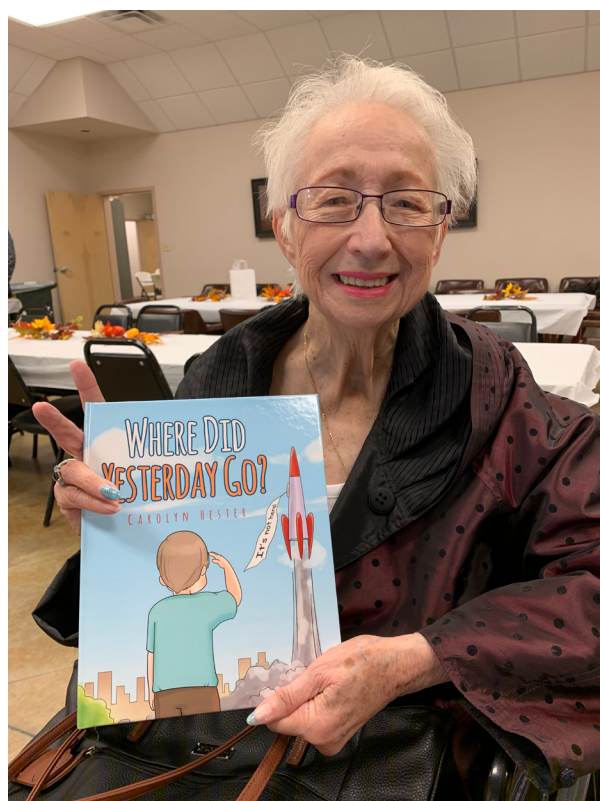


Hester's second book, "I Want a Circle Haircut, Just Like Daddy"

Hester, who lives in Wynne, taught high school home economics for 30 years and then moved to Illinois where she worked in extension at the University of Illinois, Champagne-Urbana. After returning to Arkansas, she worked five years as an FCS agent before retiring in 2000.
