Kurz hired as new extension consumer horticulture specialist

Berni Kurz, honored in Arkansas and nationally for his work as a county extension agent, has a new role to fill as consumer horticulture specialist for the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture Cooperative Extension Service.

Kurz relocated from Fayetteville to the state extension headquarters in Little Rock to begin his new role on Feb. 1.

From his undergraduate years, horticulture has been a dominant theme for the Arkansas native, who graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in horticulture and a Master of Science degree in ornamental horticulture from the University of Arkansas. He accepted a position as a Garland County extension agent immediately after his college graduation, overseeing the horticulture and 4-H programs. In 1991, he moved to Crawford County, where he led the fledgling Master Gardener program established in 1988. In 2002, Kurz was promoted to Crawford County staff chair, where his duties grew to include the Landscape Maintenance Seminar and River Valley Lawn and Garden Show.

In 2004, Kurz became staff chair in Washington County, overseeing one of the state's largest county Master Gardener groups. He has plans for his new statewide duties, as well.

Among his objectives are to "update the many out-of-date consumer horticulture publications and create new ones to support the current research-based recommended principles and practices for all Arkansas home gardeners," he said, adding that he plans to "initiate a process where Arkansas Master Gardeners will create a long-range vision to keep relevance to the program which also embraces the extension mission of the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture."

Kurz said he also plans to develop relevant consumer horticulture information to help county agents when delivering their local programs.

"We are excited to have Berni join the Horticulture department," said Wayne Mackay, head of the horticulture department for the Division of Agriculture and the Dale Bumpers College of Agriculture, Food and Life Sciences. "Berni brings many years of experience in consumer horticulture and the Master Gardener program and is a great addition to the horticulture program."

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Master Gardeners making great progress in 4-H Center Demonstration Garden

A great deal has been accomplished since Randy Forst addressed guests at last year's Retiree Luncheon. At that meeting, Forst outlined plans for a new demonstration garden to be constructed at the Arkansas 4-H Center, intending to provide a setting for educational events for 4-H'ers, students and other youth and adult groups.

The Pulaski County Master Gardeners Demonstration Garden is to include warm and cool season vegetables in raised beds, a trial garden for annual and perennial ornamental plants, fruit bushes and trees, a honey bee yard, a native plant border, commodity crops and a rain garden. A tool and equipment shed, seating areas, gravel paths and a central gazebo will also be part of the garden.

Since last year's luncheon, a core group of Master Gardener volunteers – 20 Master Gardeners and four significant others – has constructed 16 raised beds that will be planted with fruit trees, vegetables and annuals. They are working on adjusting drainage at the site, and are ready to install two beehives, eventually progressing to five.

The shell of the garden house is complete. When finished, the house

will have a handicapped-accessible restroom, sink, a place to hang coats, storage space for chairs, tools and beekeeping equipment. The gutters of the house have been designed to catch rainwater to reuse in the garden.

Master Gardener volunteers have put down landscape fabric on one-fourth of the garden area, moved

gravel and supersoil and dug trenches. They have contracted with a company to erect an 8-foot fence to keep out deer. Upon completion of the fence, scheduled for March 1, volunteers can begin planting.

"Some of the work you can't see, because it's literally underground," said Kathy Ratcliffe, past

president, Pulaski County Master Gardeners.

Last year, Master Gardeners donated 700 volunteer hours to the project. In addition to the core group of Master Gardeners, development teams and new Master Gardeners also assisted.

This summer Master Gardeners plan to begin working with Shannon Caldwell and 4-H groups in the garden for the first time and also hope to host adult groups.

The garden "will showcase plant species and varieties appropriate for central Arkansas, demonstrate research-based gardening and agricultural techniques and teach nutritional guidelines," Ratcliffe said.

Funding for the garden has come from foundations, individuals and grants. Retirees have raised money for the project, and the garden has also received in-kind services.

Ratcliffe credited the 4-H Center staff, county agents and the 4-H Foundation for their help and support throughout the process of getting this project off the ground.



Brenda Henderson Pratt dies

Brenda Henderson Pratt, age 76, of Mount Ida died Jan. 19, 2019.

Pratt joined Extension as a home economist in 1962 after graduating from the University of Arkansas. Her early assignments were in Phillips and Drew counties.

She and husband Jerry Henderson raised two sons in the Mount Ida area, where Brenda was home economics leader for Montgomery County for more than 15 years.

In 1988, she became Northwest District program leader and later associate district director for the Northwest District. She served as Southwest District director from 1997 until her retirement in 1999.

After the death of her husband Jerry, she married Larry Pratt, who also preceded her in death.

She is survived by a sister, Mavis, of Austin, Texas, son David Henderson of Mount Ida, son Greg Henderson of Bulverde, Texas, two granddaughters and two grandsons.

A celebration of Brenda's life was held Jan. 23 at Joplin United Methodist Church in Mount Ida.

UA Arthropod Museum gets new home

The thousands of shelled, winged and multi-legged arthropods squeezed into a room in the University of Arkansas' agriculture building will soon have roomier digs from which to feed to curiosity and stoke the awe of visiting schoolkids and adults.

The museum houses more than 1,000 drawers of insects, including some species found only in the Ozarks.

The collection's home is cramped, with narrow aisles making it difficult to host visitors. However, the Arthropod Museum will now be housed at 1580 Mitchell Street, right off of Razorback Road in Fayetteville.

"Part of the motivation for this move was that the museum space we have now is not very accessible," said Ken Korth, department head for the Department of Entomology and Plant Pathology. "The new space will be much improved in terms of accessibility for small groups."

The move will take place this spring and the museum will share the building with the biology department's herbarium as well as offices for the College of Education and Health Professions.
