Plunkett Catching Up on Projects

hen Don Plunkett retired in May 2011, he began working on the 120 acres he and his wife of 45½ years, Lorena, own in Grant County.

He set out to re-do the sidewalks, untangle trails in the surrounding forest and get his two ponds back into good shape. Plunkett also did some fishing and repaired deer stands so he could do some deer hunting.

A self-described workaholic, Plunkett had left lots of personal projects undone during his long employment at Extension. He was quite busy from the time he started working as an agriculture agent in Jefferson County in 1981 until his retirement 30 years later.

He came to Extension after working for 11 years as a vocational agriculture teacher in three different school districts.

After Plunkett's first post, he moved to Altheimer in 1984 to become a county Extension specialist - agronomy. The job was through special funding, and he was working at Lake Dick Farm.

In 1988, Plunkett was promoted to staff chairman in Lincoln County, and in 1993, he became staff chair for Drew County. He worked with the Cotton Research Verification Program, stationed at UAM in Monticello, beginning in 1995, and in 1998 he moved to the State Office.

In 2003, Plunkett returned to Jefferson County, where he first served as an agriculture agent, as the staff chair. He remained there until retirement.

While Plunkett was working at Extension, he also served as a pastor of a small church in west Cleveland County. Health problems caused him to resign his pastorate in August 2013. He's now "in between churches" and is back at his home church in Sheridan.

He misses his Extension colleagues and the people he worked with in the field, but they do keep in touch, especially when certain crops come due.

"I always get a call or text when the sweet corn is ready," he said. "I stay in steady supply."
