Over 65,000 school-age students (13%) in Arkansas participate in an afterschool program. In Arkansas, 79 percent of parents surveyed agree that afterschool programs help working parents keep their jobs. As the largest youth development organization in the world, 4-H has an important role in addressing the need for quality after school programs.

By providing professional development training for afterschool providers and organizing 4-H Clubs in afterschool sites we build reputations in our counties as the go-to source for all things positive youth development.

Dues paid after this date will not be eligible for state or national awards.

All payments should be sent to Sara Beth Johnson (Lonoke County). On average, preschool children spend over four and a half hours a day consuming screen media, while older children spend over seven hours a day including multitasking. Excessive screen time is linked to a number of problems for children, including childhood obesity, poor school performance, and problems with attention span. 4-H can provide materials and programs for kids during Screen-Free Week. All 4-H initiative areas can be addressed with a Screen-Free Week Celebration.

In past years during Screen-Free Week, Montgomery County Extension has provided learning activities related to citizenship, consumer education, physical activity, and healthy snacking. Prizes for the event provide the incentive kids need to participate. We received donations of bicycles, manicures, crystal digs, horseback rides, ride tickets, kayak and canoe rentals, fishing rods & reels, and summer art lessons.

From a teacher's perspective, "Screen-Free Week is a great way to encourage physical activity and limit passive activities. I heard a lot of comments (from students) about being responsible and helpful to others."

One student's testimonial, "Because I decided to be screen-free, I had a lot more spare time. Screen-Free Week showed me that there is so much more to do than to watch a screen. Eating healthy is important, as is getting enough physical activity and being a good citizen. Screen-Free Week was a great learning experience for me."

Screen-Free Week is a much needed respite from the screen media dominating the lives of so many children. ## **Arkansas 4-H Attends National SeaPerch Challenge**

Ten Arkansas 4-H members had the experience of a life time as they competed in the Sixth National SeaPerch Challenge held at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge. Thirteen hundred students from across the country, Australia, Cayman Islands and Virgin Islands, competed in an underwater robotics championship on May 21, 2016.

More than 190 teams maneuvered their hand-built remotely operated vehicles through an underwater obstacle course at the LSU natatorium. The national competition was a first time experience for Arkansas 4-H members. Two teams, The M.C. Tech Sirens senior team from Monroe County and the

Johnson County Atlantis junior team from Johnson County represented Arkansas.

The SeaPerch Challenge is also part of Arkansas 4-H's larger effort to expose kids to STEM. Attending the National SeaPerch Challenge was a wonderful opportunity for my middle school team. They learned so much by building and competing with their ROV but more than that they got to experience college and career readiness, by taking a peek inside careers available in engineering. The look on their faces when they spoke to Brittany White, Senior Project Engineer for ExxonMobil as she explained her occupation was priceless.
