



ARKANSAS BALLOT ISSUES

What's on the ballot in 2022?

Arkansas voters have a say this November whether to change the Arkansas Constitution. State legislators voted to put 3 proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot for you to decide. A citizen proposal was certified with sufficient signatures to qualify for the ballot, but the ballot title was rejected by the State Board of Election Commissioners as misleading. A lawsuit challenging that ruling has been filed with the Arkansas Supreme Court.

LEGISLATIVE PROPOSALS

- **Issue 1:** A constitutional amendment to allow the General Assembly to convene in extraordinary session upon the issuance of a joint written proclamation of the speaker of the House of Representatives and the president pro tempore of the Senate or upon the submission of a written proclamation containing the signatures of at least 2/3 of the members of the House of Representatives and at least 2/3 of the members of the Senate to the speaker of the House of Representatives and the president pro tempore of the Senate requesting that the General Assembly convene in extraordinary session
- **Issue 2:** A constitutional amendment to reform certain measures presented to voters, to be known as the "Constitutional Amendment and Ballot Initiative Reform Amendment"
- **Issue 3:** A constitutional amendment to create the "Arkansas Religious Freedom Amendment"

CITIZEN PROPOSAL

- **Issue 4:** An amendment to authorize the possession, personal use, and consumption of cannabis by adults, to authorize the cultivation and sale of cannabis by licensed commercial facilities, and to provide for the regulation of those facilities
