The Dog Days of Summer

As I was growing up, this was always July 15th to August 15th. Why those dates? – Because Daddy said so. It took years for me to understand that those dates were not "set in stone" but varied somewhat.

Of course, we now know that this is the time when Sirius, the "dog star" rises and sets with the sun. The 20 days before and after the conjunction of the "dog star" with the sun was designated as "Dog Days" by the ancient Romans. The name originally had nothing to do with live dogs.

The actual definition is:

1: the period between early July and early September when the *hot* sultry weather of summer usually occurs in the northern hemisphere

2: a period of stagnation or inactivity http://www.merriam-webster.com/dictionary/dog%20days

Natural (Organic) Gardening Course

<u>Pre-registration is required</u>. Class size is limited. The cost is \$60.00 per person, and includes the gardening book, How to Grow More Vegetables..._by John Jeavons, and 60 pages of material prepared by the instructor. <u>The course</u> includes gardening concepts and practices with emphasis on growing NUTRIENT DENSE vegetables. The concepts apply to flowers and yards. Course material is documented, and includes practical tips from 50 years of gardening experience. Topics include soils, soil testing, soil biology, selecting the garden site, tools, double-digging, composting, plant spacing, fertilizing, watering, companion planting, mulching, vermiculture, compost tea, green manure crops, nitrogen fixing crops, winter cover crops, winter gardens, pest management, weeds, paramagnetic effects, and organic gardening resources. See <u>http://harmonygardens.blogspot.com</u> There will be a garden tour later in the spring. <u>Who Should Attend:</u> The course is designed for those with little to much gardening knowledge and experience. It is not required, but if you have had a soil test, bring the soil report to class. Calvin will assist students with soil test interpretations, and provide help on fertilizer recommendations. Call if you have questions regarding these items.

Instructor: Calvin Bey, Ph.D. Calvin grew up on a farm in Michigan and is a retired USDA Forest Service scientist, with a deep concern about health and environmental issues. Over the past 50 years, he has gardened in ten different geographic areas, and has trained under John Jeavons using the Grow Biointensive® approach. He has studied gardening extensively and has grown more than 40 kinds of vegetables and fruits in his garden in Fayetteville, AR.
