Exactly what is 4-H?

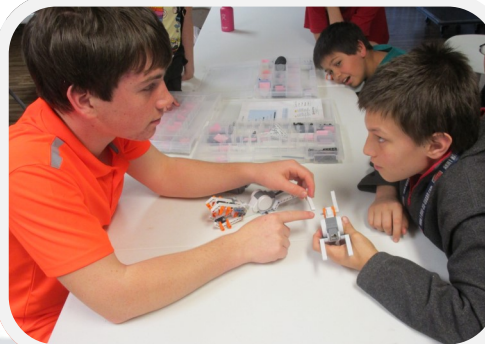
4-H is the youth development program conducted by the University of Arkansas, Division of Agriculture, Cooperative Extension Service. 4-H members can select from many activities in 82 project areas ranging from automotive to clothing to space camp.

Adult leaders, trained by county Cooperative Extension Service Faculty, teach projects to children using the "learn -by-doing" method. 4-H teaches leadership, citizenship, and skills children will use through out their lives. Each year Arkansas 4-H youth receive more than \$80,000 in college scholarships at the state level for their 4-H work. Some scholarships are available at the county level.



4-H members have the opportunity to:

4-H Projects

A 4-H project is what a 4-H'er learns, makes or does; example: learn to grow a garden, make a dress, or train a dog.

4-H members should choose at least one project each year and complete records for that project. Younger 4-H'ers should limit themselves to one or two projects per year. Older 4-H'ers may want to take three or four.
