Pollinator Garden at Gateway Farmers Market

A pollinator garden is under construction at Gateway Farmers Market, brought to you by the Miller County Red Dirt Master Gardeners. It will feature 4 raised beds, along with four Soil Solarization plots. These solarization plots will be covered with a plastic to kill weed seeds and fungal spores.

Located in the center of the garden, a Pebble Bath Fountain will be spotlighted. This fountain will be an attraction for the local butterflies!

The goal of this pollinator garden is to attract butterflies, wasps, bees, and a variety of other insects to our native plants and herbs.



You don't need a green thumb to attend the Arkansas MG auction this year. It is online, open to all, and free to attend.

Brighten Your Garden with These Pink Flowers

There's good reason for the trend of pink flowers. Not only do they add a burst of cheery pink, but some are even deer resistant. Bright pink is an attention-grabbing color while soft, light pinks tend to be calming. Either way, loading your garden with pink flowers can be stunning as well as a mood-booster. Flowers in these shades typically symbolize happiness, grace, innocence, youth, and joy. Plus, birds, bees, and other pollinators will enjoy what you're growing, too.

Petunia – Trumpet Pinks



Petunias are a full-sun favorite with lots of colors to choose from. Pink flowers come in shades from bright pink, hot pink, to salmon shades and muted pastels. There are also variegated varieties with light and dark shades mixing on the petals. You can also choose shapes – traditional trumpet-shaped flowers (that hummingbirds love), pretty ruffled flowers & mini petunias give you a smaller version of the traditional look.

Peony – The Most Popular Pink Flower

No flower is more fragrant than the peony, and their blooms come in all shades of pink. They're one of the most popular and beloved perennials. They are beautiful + don't need a lot of maintenance. Locate with lots of sun & well-draining soil, as well as good air circulation around the plant. With the proper growing conditions, your peonies can last 50-100 years!



Dianthus – Pretty in Pink

Dianthus (Sweet William) come in a variety of pinks. This is another versatile perennial with pink flowers that prefers full sun but will tolerate part shade. Dianthus, or Sweet William, comes in all kinds of sizes, from miniature varieties that top out at 6 inches to giant dianthus, which can grow up to 3 feet tall. Search for this plant in shades of pink and you'll find everything from white carnations (which are a type of dianthus) edged in pink, to fiery hot pinks. And deer seem to not like to eat these pretty pink flowers.

Astilbe – Vibrant Pink & Unusual

Astilbe, or False Goat's Beard is a deer-resistant & beautiful choice. Shade gardens look lovely with a little pink & that's where astilbe saves the day. Hardy in zones 4 through 8, these plants are known for plumes of tiny flowers and pretty foliage. Astilbe come in light pinks, apricot pinks, deep pinks and pink purple.



Bleeding Heart – Pink & Unique

Bleeding hearts are a top pick for shade gardens, not only because they grow well in shade but also because of the unusual fronds of heart-shaped flowers they produce. They come in a variety of colors, from soft to bold pink, even bright red. They're easy keepers, too, growing in hardiness zones 2 through 9, preferring cool shade and moist soil.

Daylilies – The Garden Classic

Orange is the color that come to mind when we think of daylilies (known as "tiger lilies"), but these flowers come in a number of beautiful shades and shapes. You'll find dozens of varieties ranging from light to dark—and multicolored, too. Best of all, the daylily is known as a resilient plant. They prefer full sun, but will bloom reliably in a variety of soil conditions. They're can grow in hardiness zones 3 thru 9.

Rose Begonias – Delicate Pinks

Want to fill a shady area with beautiful rosy blooms? Rose begonia is what you're looking for. These pretty perennials are perfect for pots on porches, though you can plant them in beds, too. Begonias are a tender perennial—they won't

survive the winter unless you dig up their tubers and bring them indoors. But in zones 9 through 11, they can stay outside so long as there is no danger of freezing.

Yarrow – A Tough Beauty

Yarrow is a tough perennial. It likes full sun but tolerates partial shade & grows in hardiness zones 3 to 9. It's drought tolerant, which makes it great for sandy, clay, or well-drained soils.
