## BABY, IT'S OK TO PLAY WHEN IT'S COLD OUTSIDE!



As temperatures get cooler, it becomes more difficult to get everyone ready to go outside. Kids need jackets and then hats, coats, and gloves. Some parents may be against sending kids outside to play when it is cold, and others may be upset if you don't go outside. It's important to communicate with parents about what your policies are, and to help them understand the importance of outdoor, active play regardless of temperature. AR Minimum Licensing states that at least one hour of outdoor play per day is required in "suitable weather."

Your center can make the cold weather call based on wind chill, whether there is snow or other precipitation, and whether the kids have appropriate clothing and coats. If you decide to keep kids inside, make sure they have space and time to run around in vigorous play every day. Remember: Kids need to move! Everyone's lives will be easier if kids are given the time and space to move their bodies.

- Communicate with parents that kids need warm clothing and a coat. Keep a few extra jackets or coats around if possible.
- **Send home notices about cold weather** activities like STEM experiments and art projects that you can only do when it's cold! Melt ice or snow, examine frost patterns, or watch your foggy breath!
- If you are stuck inside, get creative on vigorous play time. Have a parade, play follow the leader, or play jump or throwing games. If you don't have access to an open indoor play space, move furniture in your classroom for open space.
- Resist the temptation to replace play time with screen time.













## **CANDY CORN FRUIT PARFAIT**

This is a fun breakfast or snack recipe you can use this fall. Children can help assemble it and will love the candy corn resemblance!



Yield: 2-4 parfaits, depending on glass size.

## Ingredients:

1 can (11 oz) Mandarin Oranges 1 can (20 oz) Pineapple Chunks 2 containers (6 oz) Vanilla Yogurt 1 bag Candy Corn

## Directions:

- 1. Drain the juice from both cans of fruit.
- 2. Layer 1/3 of each glass with pinapple chunks, followed by an equal layer of mandarin oranges.
- 3. Top each serving with a generous dollop of your favorite vanilla yogurt and a decorative piece of candy corn.



## Alternative Ingredients:

- For the yellow layer, you use bananas, peaches, yellow apples, or pears.
- For the orange layer, use tangerines, apricots, mango, or cantalope.
- In place of yogurt, use whipped cream or vanilla pudding.

## **PUMPKIN SENSORY BAG**

because it teaches them what's inside of a pumpkin and what pumpkin guts and seeds feel like. And there's no mess! Kids will love it and it's easy!

## Supplies:

- Pumpkin guts
- Ziploc gallon size freezer bags
- Items to fill the bag for an I-spy activity (you can use Halloween erasers found in the Target dollar bins and plastic shapes found at the Dollar Store)

## Instructions:



To prepare the sensory bags, scoop out the inside of a pumpkin and place it in a gallon-size Ziploc freezer bag.

You can make your bags with just pumpkin guts, or you can add other items for an I-spy activity.





After the bags are prepared, invite the children to explore them. Let them squish the bags and search for the items inside.

#### What to do:

## Finger Painting

#### What you'll need:

- Water-based finger paints
- Paper or Cloth
- Smocks

#### What to do:

- 1. Mix water-based finger paints.
- 2. Have children make handprints to represent leaf shapes on murals, cloth, paper and windows. Young children can be messy finger painters so make sure they have on smocks or old clothes.


