The Importance of Inviting "Grown-Ups" to School

Professionals who have worked in early childhood education for any length of time have certainly worked with children with different family structures. Some kids live with mom and dad. Some kids live with mom and siblings or dad and stepmom. Some kids live with two moms or two dads. Some kids live with grandparents or aunts and uncles. Some kids live in foster homes or another type of family situation that may not be permanent.

Annual events like "Muffins with Mom" or "Donuts with Dad" are often held before Mother's and Father's Days. Maybe your center has events for Grandparents' Day or some other special "invite an adult" day. In the past few years, however, more and more schools have moved to inclusive events such as "Donuts with Grown-Ups" or "Muffins in the Morning" to include and celebrate the diverse caregivers in children's lives.

Why does this simple change matter? Changing just one word can signal to

families that your school sees and acknowledges that the grown-ups in kids' lives are important even if they don't fit a "typical" structure. Even in situations where kids live with mom and dad, having events that invite only one of them implies that the other isn't welcome. For example, my husband travels a lot during the summer and is typically not home for the pre-Father's Day breakfast. As a mom, I never was sure whether to go or not. Should I leave my child with no grown-up at all,



or risk being the only mom? And when I have gone, I've felt the need to explain "Her dad is out of town."

Inclusive language like "grown-up" allows kids and families to send who is available and offers an opportunity for family engagement with whomever takes care of the child without a need for seeking permission ("I know it says Donuts with Dad, but she doesn't have a dad. Can grandma come instead?") or for apologizing ("I'm sorry, honey, Pawpaw lives too far away to make it to grandparents' day. Is it OK with you if Aunt Mollie comes instead?"). Ultimately, inclusive language doesn't change anything about the events, it simply allows all kids and families to feel welcome, included, and special.

Ingredients


- 2 cups plain greek yogurt
- 1/4 cup honey or maple syrup
- 3 Tbsp milk
- 1/4 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/3 cup dye-free sprinkles (divided)

Steps:

- 1. In a medium bowl, mix together the yogurt, honey and vanilla extract
- 2. Add in sprinkles & stir
- 3. Pour into popsicle molds
- 4. Add in more sprinkles
- 5. Freeze for at least 4 hours then enjoy!

CRAFT TIE-DYE BEACH TOWEL



- Spray tie dye kit
- Duct tape
- White beach or bath towels
- Warm water

Steps:

- 1. Cover your work surface with the disposable table cloth.
- 2. With duct tape, add your desired name to the white beach towel.
- 3. Put on your gloves and start spraying the fabric dye colors onto the towel.
- 4. If you have a thick cotton towel, the colors may not bleed through the towel. In that case, turn the towel over and repeat spraying the colors on the back in the same pattern.
- 5. Let the towel air dry. Once both sides are dry, remove the tape and rinse the towel in cold water. Then wash in the washer and dry.

Orange Bird Feeder

Have fun with this easy, inexpensive, and minimal-supply activity!


Materials Needed:

- Orange Knife and spoon
- **Bird Seed**
- Scissors
- Twine/ String

Directions:

- Teacher/Parent, using a knife slice an orange in half 1. in the opposite direction that you would slice it if you were eating it.
- 2. Using a spoon, hollow out the center or "flesh" of the orange to create a bowl.
- 3. Create string holes in all four edges with scissors and run string through to create a hanging basket.
