#### **MEETING HIGHLIGHTS**

#### ~Business~

- We met at St. James United Methodist Church in Little Rock. The meeting was called to order by Becky Gibson, Vice President, who shared presiding duties with President Kay Roberts.
- Meeting minutes from January 23, 2024, were approved by members following a motion by Liz Hale and a second by Cheryl Stevens.
- The County 76 Financial Report for the 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter 2024 was presented by Treasurer Gail McClure. Prior to approval of the report, questions about line-item amounts were raised. It is helpful to remember that financial processes of the University of Arkansas Department of Agriculture were changed in October 2023. We traditionally had a private account and a CES (Cooperative Extension Service) account. All money activities were changed from two accounts to only the CES account. Our data is kept in the approved system of UADA, Workday. Due to the flow of income and expense posting, it is possible our reports may show expenses of a line item higher than the income of that item. This was the case for County 76 meeting expenses and PNG Leadership expenses. Gail McClure, Treasurer and Linda Soffer, Assistant Treasurer prepare and present a report with income and expenses per quarter beside our proposed and approved annual budget. Following clarification, Kay Roberts announced that the report was approved for filing as presented.
- Susan Colles, Scholarship Chair, reported on the 2024 Janet B. Carson County Sanctioned Project Awards. This year there were eleven (11) applicants. Usually there are 2 or 3. We were excited about that. Our approved budget for these awards was \$1500. The committee voted to approve a scholarship for The Reflection Point Native Habitat Pollinator Garden in Pope County. (Susan did not vote as this is her home county.) Also awarded was the Clark County Library Project. These school scholarships totaled \$1,150. As there were more outstanding applications, the committee requested the board and membership to approve adding \$1,050 to these scholarships, to make two more scholarships possible. The Board has approved these additional funds. David Kuh moved for approval with a second by James Lamb. Membership approved. The committee will meet and select these awards.
- Susan Colles reported on the 2024 Janet B. Carson High School Senior Scholarship Awards. The approved budget for this is \$8,000. This is 4 awards of \$2,000. We had eleven (11) applications from ten (10) counties. 6 applications were disqualified due to not meeting application requirements. These students were selected.

  - Taryn McGee (Pope Co) Arkansas Tech University
  - Ian Price (Saline Co) Arkansas State University Beebe
  - Shaylee Smith (Greene Co) Arkansas State University

- Susan Colles shared a new Scholarship award approved by the Board in October 2023. This is the 2024 Janet B. Carson Continuing Higher Education Scholarship. Budget for this is \$4,000 total for 4 awards of \$1,000 each. The opportunity to apply for this will be offered to those awarded the 2023 Janet B. Carson High School Senior Scholarship. Susan told us the criteria for applying and receiving the Continuing Scholarship. This is a one-time award. We will report further on this, as well as evaluate and consider its continuance.
- Randy Forst, our Arkansas Master Gardener Coordinator, brings an activity update to our membership meetings. Since we last met, Randy has traveled many miles and spoken to many people, successfully contributing to the growth and success of the Arkansas Master Gardener Program. Training new Master Gardeners continues. We have 2024 training-completers in these counties: Washington, Garland, Saline, Grant, Montgomery, Hot Spring, and Benton. Randy traveled and trained in these counties: White, Union, Hot Spring, Logan, Garland (2x), Baxter, Ouachita, Faulkner, Clark, Carroll, Logan, Benton, Grant, Nevada, and Cross. Randy talked about the many Master Gardener Plant Sales scheduled around the state. He reminded us that he had created a Plant Sales video with information about holding Master Gardener plant sales.
- In his spare time, Randy is also coordinator for Arkansas Consumer Horticulture Groups. He was active in these: Arkansas Grown Association, Arkansas Cut Flower Association, Grow Your Own Groceries, and a Pruning Demonstration in Hempstead County.
- Randy introduced a guest, Winfrey Norton, who is from Northwest Arkansas and a participant in this year's Federal Leadership Training, LeadAR. Winfrey spoke to us about 'The People's Garden'. As part of his work in LeadAR, he came to encourage us to learn about this initiative and work to register gardens online. #### ~Education~



County 76 attendees were treated to a presentation by Mr. Mel White from Little Rock. Mel White is originally from Conway and graduated from Hendrix College. Mel White has worked as a newspaper and magazine writer and editor and a composer/producer at a recording studio. In 1990, he became a freelance writer specializing in travel and nature. He has written more than 50 articles for National Geographic and National Geographer Traveler magazines and has written or contributed to more than 30 travel and nature guidebooks. He has covered

subjects including the Amazon River, Australia's Great Barrier Reef, the Swiss Alps, Borneo, New Guinea, New Zealand, Ireland, Jamaica, crocodiles, manatees, orangutans, and birds of paradise.

We heard about Mel and his vast expertise following his presentation to the Garland County Master Gardeners. His true love in nature is butterflies – all butterflies. His topic is 'WHAT BUTTERFLIES TAUGHT ME ABOUT BOTANY'.

Mel told of his path to loving Butterflies. He grew up with a mother who was a birdwatcher. He was a birdwatcher all his life. When in the woods watching birds, he noticed butterflies. In the '70's and '80's he became interested and wanted to learn more about them, but they were hard to find and not easy to get close to – or even find something to read about them. Then in 2000, Jeffery Glassberg wrote a series of books titled 'BUTTERFLIES THROUGH BINOCULARS', because at the time those interested were unable to find a professional guidebook for learning about butterflies in Florida.

Mel found that his binoculars for birdwatching did not focus close enough to identify butterflies. He could get focus from twelve (12) feet, but then was able to get a focus from 4 feet with a pair of better binoculars. He explained that all butterflies belonged to the scientific order 'Lepidoptera'. They are further grouped into a family and genus.

Interesting is the structure of butterfly wings. Mel said they are not just a flat sheet of colors, but are a thin membrane covered with scales. The name 'Lepidoptera' is derived from the Greek for 'scaled wing'. The wings are covered with thousands and thousands of scales which are layered much like the shingles on a roof. When the butterfly leaves the chrysalis, the scales are known as 'fresh'. The colors are bright and sharp. As the butterfly ages – about 2 or 3 weeks, the colors fade and often the wings become 'ragged'.

Lepidoptera includes butterflies and moths. There are about 17,000 species of butterflies. Every member of this order that is not a butterfly is a moth – there are about 160,000 species of moths. Mel said many moths are dull and they come out at night – so if you study them, 'good luck to you':)

Mel told us that when you think about food for butterflies – the food for the life cycle which is the butterfly is nectar from almost any bloom that has nectar. The important piece of information about food for butterflies is to know that most female butterflies will only lay

eggs on a specific plant to have nutrients ready for the growing caterpillar. For instance, the Zebra Swallowtails will only lay on the Pawpaw plant.


Mel then showed pictures of butterflies and talked through some common butterfly families. He told us where they could be found, what they would eat, how they were named, and other interesting facts. The families were Swallowtails; Whites & Sulphurs; Coppers; Harvester; Hairstreaks; Blues; Metalmarks; Longwings & Fritillaries; Crescents & Checkerspots; Typical Brushfoots; Satyrs; Spread-wing Skippers; and Grass Skippers.

The photos were beautiful and there was a lot of information. It was interesting to learn about the process of observing and documenting butterflies as we are highly interested in knowing more about pollinator and plant connections.



# Advanced Training (AT) Project Meeting Report

 Joellen reported that all the Advanced Training documents and forms have been updated, and now posted on the Master Gardener website.



 3 hours of Advanced Training were held by Zoom on January 24, 204. Pulaski County hosted this training. Six hundred (600) were registered. Three hundred three (303) were on Zoom. Some counties met to watch.


