MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

~Business~

- Our president, Kay Roberts, called the meeting to order. Kay welcomed everyone, and especially our visitors. She explained that our meeting today would be shortened due to a winter weather prediction.
- Following the morning presentation by Mr. Desmond Simmons, Owner of Lake in the Willows Apiary, Kay Roberts facilitated the current business of County 76. She began with reminding members that the minutes of our October 25, 2022, Membership Meeting were emailed to them by Darlene McGuire, Secretary. There were no questions, and following a motion and second the minutes were approved as written.
- Debbie Howell, Treasurer, came forward to present the Financial Report for the 4th Quarter of 2022, the End-of-Year Totals, and the County 76 Proposed Budget for 2023. Detailed handouts were available to members at the registration table. Financial activity of the County 76 private account resulted in a balance of \$43,957.55 and the CES account balance on 12/31/2022 was \$57,888.30. The County 76 2023 Proposed Budget shows the projected income to be \$33,235.00 with expenses to be shared by both our private and CES accounts. A question was asked, "Why does the proposed budget show no expenses for Master Gardener Appreciation Day?" We learned that the UADA will cover those costs. The Financial Report for 4th Quarter and End-of-Year 2022, as well as the 2023 Proposed Budget were approved by membership.
- Kay Roberts announced that a Technology Support Team has been created. Daniel Gladstone <u>dgeeshot@gmail.com</u> C: 501-269-3030 is the coordinator. He is seeking volunteers to help when online conferencing or training is required. Please contact Daniel directly to volunteer.
- Proposed changes to the County 76 Bylaws were emailed to membership fifteen (15) days prior to our meeting. Members present approved these changes. (Changes are underlined.)

ARTICLE III – Membership

E. County 76 Master Gardeners, whose fiscal year shall be from January 1 through December 31, will hold at least four meetings per year. Meetings cancelled due to inclement weather or other reasons will be rescheduled at the discretion of the Executive Board or held by Zoom. All financial and reporting statistics shall be based on the fiscal year.

F. The Executive Board may implement the use of a Zoom format for any County 76 meeting if circumstances dictate i.e., including and not limited to weather, restrictions set by the State Office, or any unforeseen situation.

<u>G. Each member is responsible to communicate any changes in mailing address, email or phone numbers to the 2nd Vice President.</u>

H. If a member chooses to resign from County 76, an email confirming the desire of resignation should be communicated to the 2nd Vice President.

ARTICLE VI – Duties of Officers

C. The 2nd Vice President shall:

1) Perform the duties of the 1st Vice President whenever the 1st Vice President is absent.

2) Coordinate update of volunteer manual, including quarterly Roster updates.

3) Coordinate changes of members records such as address, phone, email, or status of said member, including quarterly Roster updates.

4) Coordinate general membership meeting registration, including new attendee contact.

5) Announce new member induction at membership meetings.

6) Serve as Online Manager for County 76 hours reporting.

7) Provide an updated list of current members and project hours to the Executive Board by the first meeting of each fiscal year.

8) Update County 76 Timeline for each year based on Project activities.

Our presenter was Mr. Desmond Simmons, owner of Lake in the Willows Apiary located in Scott, Arkansas. Desmond and his wife, Joyce, started several years ago in the bee business. He has a fulltime job and works at the Apiary as a side job. His presentation was informational, even for those who are familiar with honey beekeeping. Desmond shared the make-up of a bee colony. The individuals in a colony depend on the time of year. Worker bees are between 85-99

% of the colony. Drones are 0 - 15%, and there is usually one queen bee. The life cycle of bees was covered. Desmond shared that he uses Langstroth Beehives. Langstroth Hives were created in 1860 and we were told about the parts and how Desmond uses them. Desmond was a personable presenter who shared the humor of this work by telling us some of the mistakes he has made such as leaving a frame out and having the bees build comb on it.

Practical advice for those who are looking at beekeeping was provided. Desmond's advice was to research and know what is involved. He explained the work of the State Plant Board. You must register your hive and have approval. Beekeepers with in a 3 mile radius and others near you will be notified if you set up a hive. The reason for this is possible disease. He said if you want to learn before investing a lot of money, find a beekeeper who will allow you to work with him/her.

Next, we learned about bee swarming. Bees swarm when conditions in the hive become less than desirable. This could be a strong honey flow or the hive becomes too crowded. Swarming is the bee way to make a new colony. Should this happen, the State Plant Board will help you free with removing a swarm outside.

Most interesting, Desmond shared his work of grafting Queen Bees. He created a special tool for this work. It is a wooden frame with horizontal wooden bars holding small cups. Queens are grafted from April to September.

Desmond and Joyce gladly share their 'environmentally friendly' practices, such as using every part of bee products. Lake in the Willows Apiary maintains approximately 150 hives at their farm and for others. We learned about bee pollen, bee bread, and bees' wax.

We also were told about the dire situation with honeybee colonies in our country and state. Beekeepers in the United States lost an estimated 45.5% of the managed honeybee colonies. This is the second highest annual loss on record. Arkansas Honeybees loss rates were 44%.

Many great questions came from gardeners there. We learned about the shelf life of

honey. It is truly a stable product and will eventually turn to sugar. We learned about warming it up in hot water. Desmond was asked about grafting Queens, "How do you get started?" The answer was researching the process and talking to others who do it.

We were told about ways to search for hive problems, as well as ways we can support this work. They are:

1.Plant bee-friendly flowers and flowering herbs in your garden and yard.

2.Let the weeds grow - you may not like them, but bees love them! 3.Eliminate the use of pesticides. Use other natural methods of pest control.

4.Donate to an organization dedicated to helping protect and promote honeybees and other pollinators.

5. Support local beekeepers by purchasing and eating local raw honey.

Desmond and Joyce brought products for purchase. At the aviary, they produce queens, have starter hives, pollen, raw honey, honeycomb, creamed honey, and beeswax products.

A list of important features recommended for this system was shared and read to be followed by member comments, questions, and suggestions. Jane Burrow presented a newly created spreadsheet summary of existing AT credits that she and Linda Soffer produced. It was agreed that this would be a valuable tool for transferring from our existing system into the new process for documenting training and awarding accomplishments of Master Gardeners statewide. The work for this new system is ongoing. Randy Forst, State Coordinator, shared that there would be an Advanced Training at the State Office the end of June 2023. The topic will be *Hybridizing Day Lilies*. Details to come.
